Section A: LIONS

A1 - Sleeping Lions

Set the Scene: Ask all the girls to lie down on the floor, close their eyes, and pretend to be "sleeping lions".

The Goal: The lions must stay completely still and quiet—not even giggling or moving their eyes.

The Hunter: One or two leaders (or older girls) act as the "hunter(s)" and walk around trying to make the lions move.

How to Win: The hunter can tell jokes, make funny faces, or ask questions, but they **cannot** touch the lions.

Elimination: If a lion moves or laughs, they are out and must join the hunters to help make the others move.

Winner: The last lion to remain still and quiet wins

Pin the Tail on the Lion – A twist on the classic donkey!

A2 - Lion Beetle Drive

What is a Beetle Drive?

A traditional British party game where players roll dice to gradually build a picture of a beetle by drawing different body parts in order. The first person (or team) to complete their beetle wins. For a **Lion Beetle Drive**, you simply swap the beetle for a lion!

Equipment Needed

- Dice (1 per table/team)
- Lion drawing sheets
- Pencils or pens
- Timer or whistle
- Optional lion decorations/music/prizes

Lion Drawing Order

Assign each dice number to a lion body part.

Example:

Dice Roll Lion Part

1	Body
2	Head
3	Tail
4	Legs
5	Mane
6	Face details (eyes/nose/whiskers)

Rules

- You must roll the **body first**.
 - Then add parts in any order.
 - Mane can only be added after the head.
 - First completed lion wins
-

Ways to Make It More Fun

Younger Sections

- Use pre-printed lion outlines.
- Add stickers instead of drawing.
- Roar every time someone rolls a 5 for the mane.
- Play “lion music” between rounds.

Older Sections

- Speed rounds
- Team tables
- “Best decorated lion” prize
- Add silly challenge cards:
 - Draw with your non-dominant hand.
 - Draw while roaring.
 - Safari trivia bonus turns.

A3 – Lion Corners

In the UK, **Corners** (often called **Four Corners**) is a simple playground, hall, or classroom game.

How to Play

You need:

- Four corners of a room, hall, or marked area.
- At least 5 players

Setup:

1. Number the corners 1–4.
2. Choose one player to be the **Caller** (or "It").
3. The Caller stands in the middle with their eyes closed.

Playing the Game:

1. The Caller counts slowly (for example, from 10 down to 0).
2. While they are counting, all other players quietly move to one of the four corners.
3. When the count finishes, everyone must be standing in a corner.
4. Without looking, the Caller calls out a corner number (or points to a corner).
5. Everyone in that corner is **out** and sits down.
6. The Caller repeats the process with the remaining players.
7. The last player left wins and becomes the next Caller.

Girlguiding Lion-Themed Version

For your **Lions on the Loose Challenge**, you could rename the corners:

Pride Rock, Safari Trail, Bravery Den, Community Corner

Or use famous lions: Simba, Nala, Aslan, Leo

The caller counts with their eyes closed and calls out one of the lion-themed corners instead of a number.

Older Guides and Rangers Variation

Instead of elimination:

- Players in the chosen corner earn **1 point**.
- Everyone plays for 10–15 rounds.
- The player with the **fewest points** wins because they were hardest to predict.

This keeps everyone involved and works well with teenagers.

This would make a good warm-up activity for the opening session of your Lions on the Loose challenge.

A4 – Pom Pom Lions

Pom pom lions

You'll need:

- Wool (yellow and orange)
- Scissors
- Pompom maker or cardboard circles

1. If using cardboard, draw out your circles, and cut them out. You will need two.
2. Start with the yellow wool, wrapping around the disc until you have several layers of wool.
3. Once you have enough, start adding the orange wool to create the mane.
4. When you've finished wrapping, cut the wool around the outside, between the two layers of cardboard.
5. Take a length of wool and place it between the two cardboard layers, tying the length tight to secure your pompom.
6. Remove the cardboard, trim and fluff up the pompom, adding googly eyes, a nose and mouth.



1. If using pompom maker, start with the yellow wool, wrapping the yellow wool in the middle of each side until you think there are enough layers.
2. Add in orange wool and continue to wrap around each side of the maker. When full, join the two sides of the maker together.
3. Cut a length of wool and cut around the pompom maker, tying the wool tightly to secure in place.
4. Trim and fluff up the pompom, adding googly eyes, a nose and mouth.

A5 – Catch a Lion’s Tail

The **Lions Tails** game is an active, fast-paced warm-up tag game popular in physical education and youth groups. The objective is for "Lions" (chasers) to snatch the "tails" (cloths) tucked into the shorts or waistbands of escaping players. It is a fun active game that is a lion-themed version of "Duck, Duck, Goose."

How to Play

1. Everyone sits in a circle.
2. Choose one player to be the **Lion**.
3. Give the Lion a tail tucked into the back of their waistband.
4. The Lion walks around the outside of the circle, gently tapping each person's head and saying "Lion."
5. When the Lion taps someone and says "**Hyena!**", that player jumps up and chases the Lion around the circle.
6. The Hyena tries to grab the Lion's tail before the Lion reaches and sits in the Hyena's empty spot.
7. If the Hyena grabs the tail, the Lion stays Lion and the game continues.
8. If the Lion reaches the empty spot safely, the Hyena becomes the new Lion and wears the tail.

Easy Ways to Make a Lion Tail

Option 1 – Fabric Tail (Best)

- Cut a strip of yellow, gold, or brown fabric about 50–75 cm long.
- Tie a knot at one end.
- Add strands of wool or ribbon to the end to make a tuft.
- Tuck the other end into a waistband.

Option 2 – Wool Tail

- Braid 3–6 lengths of yellow or brown wool.
- Tie a large pom-pom or tassel on one end.
- Tuck into a waistband.
- Stuff lightly with tissue or cotton wool.
- Add a felt or wool tuft.

Option 3– Quick Guide Meeting Version

- Use a neckerchief, sash, or strip of fabric.
- Tie several strands of wool to one end.
- Takes less than 5 minutes to make.

























Alternative Running Game

If you have a larger space, every player can wear a tail tucked into their waistband. Players run around trying to collect other players' tails while protecting their own. The player with the most tails at the end wins.

For the **Lions on the Loose Challenge**, I'd suggest using braided yellow and brown wool with a fluffy pom-pom on the end—it looks lion-like, is inexpensive, and Rainbows through Rangers can help make their own tails as a quick craft before playing.

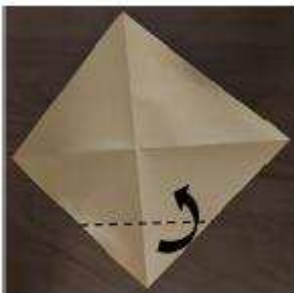
Lion origami – simple



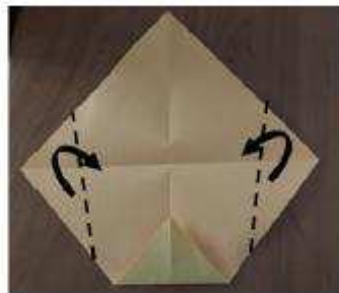
Start with a square piece of paper and fold the bottom half to the top, corner to corner.



Open the paper out and fold left half to right, corner to corner and unfold.



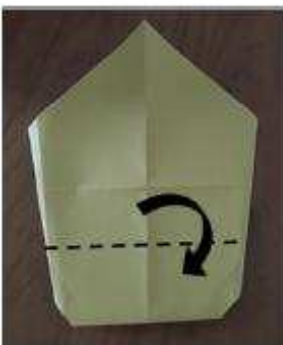
Fold bottom corner up along dotted line.



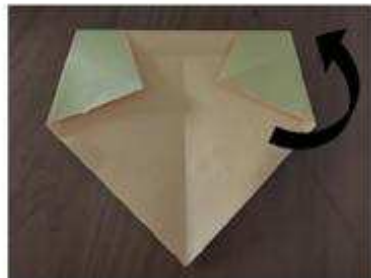
Fold the left and right corners in along the dotted lines.



Flip the paper over.



Fold down the top down over halfway, along the dotted lines.



Turn the paper over.

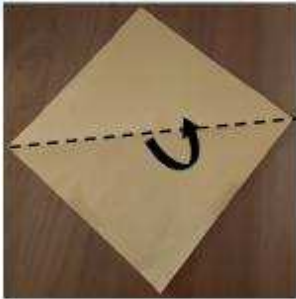


Add a face.

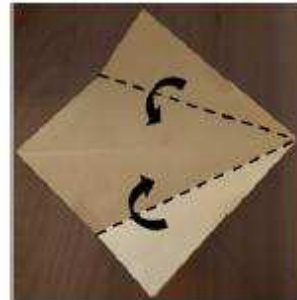

Unfold the triangle and fold both sides to the centre line.



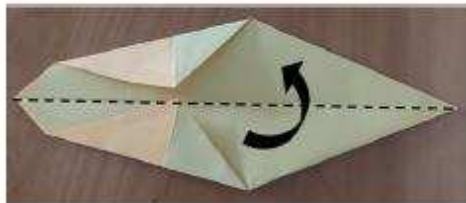
Fold a tiny bit of the top layer of paper behind the dotted line.

Make an inside fold along the dotted line.

What is a Lion?

The lion (*Panthera leo*) is one of the world's largest wild cats. Lions are famous for their strength, teamwork and powerful roar. They are often called the **King of the Beasts**.

Where Do Lions Live?

Most wild lions live in Africa, particularly in:

- Kenya
- Tanzania
- Botswana
- South Africa
- Zimbabwe

A small population of **Asiatic Lions** lives in India's Gir Forest.

Lion Families

Lions live in groups called **prides**.

A pride usually includes:

- Lionesses
- Cubs

- One or more male lions

Lionesses often hunt together and help raise all the cubs.

Male and Female Lions

Male Lions

- Larger than females
- Grow a mane
- Defend territory
- Can weigh over 250kg

Female Lions

- Do most of the hunting
 - Work as a team
 - Care for cubs
 - Faster and more agile
-

The Lion's Mane

A lion's mane:

- Protects its neck
 - Makes it appear larger
 - Can be blond, brown, red or black
 - Becomes fuller with age
-

Lion Cubs

A baby lion is called a **cub**.

Cubs:

- Are born with spots
- Weigh about 1–2kg
- Stay hidden for several weeks
- Learn from older lions

What Do Lions Eat?

Lions are carnivores.









Common prey includes:

- Zebra
- Wildebeest
- Antelope
- Buffalo
- Warthogs

Lion Superpowers

- ✓ Excellent night vision
- ✓ Powerful jaws and teeth
- ✓ Sharp claws
- ✓ Strong hearing
- ✓ Teamwork when hunting
- ✓ Roar heard up to 8 km away

Amazing Lion Facts

-  Lions are the only big cats that regularly live in family groups.
-  Lions can sleep up to 20 hours a day.
-  Every lion has a unique whisker pattern.
-  Lionesses do most of the hunting.
-  Lions can leap more than 10 metres.
-  A pride's territory can cover over 250 square kilometres.
-  Lions communicate by roaring, growling, purring and body language.
-  Lions can see about six times better than humans in low light.

Are Lions Endangered?

Lion populations have declined because of:

- Habitat loss
- Human-wildlife conflict
- Loss of prey
- Illegal hunting

Lions are classified as **Vulnerable** and are protected by conservation organisations around the world.

Girlguiding Harlow fundraiser for St Clare Hospice Lions on the Loose

Here are 10 fundraising ideas suggested by the Lions on the Loose team and other volunteers:

1. **Bake sale:** Have a “Lion’s Den” bake sale with lion-themed biscuits and cakes or hold a cake decorating competition.
2. **Dance party:** Put on a ‘roaring dance party’ where everyone attends dressed in lion colours or animal prints, and dances to wild music.
3. **Safari walk:** Host a nature walk around your community, sell maps and spot lions in windows. Return your completed sheet for a prize.
